## Chapter 1( PART 2) USE OF LINKING VERB "IS,AM,ARE"

Q1. What are linking verbs?

A: Linking verbs are verbs that connect the subject of a sentence to its complement. They do not show action but rather describe a state or condition.

Rules for Using "Is," "Am," and "Are": Q2. When do we use "is"? A: "Is" is used with singular subjects (he, she, it, or singular nouns). Examples: She is a teacher. The sky is blue. Q3. When do we use "am"? A: "Am" is used only with the singular subject "I." Examples: I am a student. I am feeling happy today. Q4. When do we use "are"? A: "Are" is used with plural subjects (you, we, they, or plural nouns). Examples: They are playing football. You are very kind. Q5. What happens when forming questions with "is," "am," and "are"?

To form a question, the verb is placed at the beginning of the sentence.

1. Is she your friend?

Examples:

- 2. Am I late for the class?
- 3. Are they coming to the party?

Q6. How do "is," "am," and "are" work in negative sentences?

Ans-

Add "not" after the verb to make the sentence negative.

Examples:

- 1. She is not here.
- 2. I am not ready.
- 3. They are not at home.

Q7. Can "is," "am," and "are" be used as helping verbs?

Ans

Yes, they can be used as helping verbs in present continuous tense.

Examples:

- 1. She is writing a letter.
- 2. I am studying for my exams.
- 3. They are playing in the park.

## Chapter 2 USE OF LINKING VERB "WAS, WERE"

Q1. What are "was" and "were"?

A: "Was" and "were" are forms of the verb "to be" used in the past tense.

Rules for Using "Was" and "Were":

Q2. When do we use "was"?

A:

"Was" is used with singular subjects (I, he, she, it, or singular nouns). Examples:

1. He was at home yesterday.

2. The weather was very cold last night.
3. I was happy to see you.
Q3. When do we use "were"? A:
"Were" is used with plural subjects (you, we, they, or plural nouns). Examples:
They were playing football.
2. You were late for the meeting.
3. The students were in the classroom.
Q4. Can "was" and "were" be used in questions? A:
Yes, to form questions, "was" and "were" are placed at the beginning of the sentence. Examples:
1. Was he at the party?
2. Were you at the library?
Q5. How do we use "was" and "were" in negative sentences? A:
Add "not" after "was" or "were" to make the sentence negative.  Examples:
1. He was not at school yesterday.

2. They were not ready for the game.
